Our federal government provides funding to schools to help families in need through a variety of programs. One of those programs is for families needing assistance with paying for school breakfast and lunch. Anyone displaced or experiencing a loss of income during the COVID closures, living with a family member other than parent (such as a grandparent, aunt, uncle, or even friend), receiving any government assistance or whose income qualifies for assistance can receive free or reduced pricing on school breakfast and lunch. This program not only helps the families, it also helps the school. The more families that qualify for these programs, the more federal funding our school receives for additional academic programing. This program is designed to help you, your family, and the school. This is a confidential program where students who qualify receive the same meals as students who pay. In the past few years, our district's free and reduced numbers have decreased, yet it is strongly felt that the need among our students and community has increased. This means that we are missing families we could be assisting, perhaps in part because the application form isn't being completed or submitted. Wellington-Napoleon offers a variety of Special Programs to meet the needs of all students. Each program is designed to ensure students are successful in their academic achievements. The following programs are offered:

Wellington-Napoleon School District provides a free, appropriate public education in the least restrictive environment to all eligible children with disabilities between the ages of three to 21. Disabilities include: -Autism -Deaf/blindness -Emotional Disorders -Hearing impairments and deafness -Mental retardation-Intellectual Disabilities -Multiple disabilities -Orthopedic impairment -Other health impairments -Specific learning disabilities -Speech or language impairment -Traumatic brain injury -Visual impairment/ blindness -Young child with developmental delay. For children ages 3 - 5, the Early Childhood Special Education program offers similar services for kids demonstrating disabilities or significant developmental delays. The Early Childhood students may be transported to Lexington and attend the Lexington Early Childhood Center. For K -12 students, appropriate services are offered in regular and special education settings. The related services of speech and language therapies, occupational therapy, and physical therapy are also provided as needed. 




We will continue with the implementation of our sensory room. This will be our third year of having a full time staff member that will serve the students' needs throughout the day in the sensory room. I am excited to continue to give our students this opportunity. We will also add the full time services of Bailey Williams, a school-based therapist, who will focus on mental health concerns of individuals.

We have purchased new Social Studies resources that we will implement this year. Both printed and digital resources will be used to teach and learn the subject. Our 3rd graders will be studying Missouri History throughout the year, which is a change from the past when the 4th grade focused on Missouri History. The state has realigned the standards, so 4th grade now focuses on Geography and 5th grade on U.S. History.

We will no longer be using STAR testing to monitor the progress of our students from the beginning of the year to the end of the year. We will be switching to the ACT Aspire for our benchmark assessments; which is what the middle school and high school use as well. The role of the WN R-9 School Board is to make policies and decisions that lead to the success of our students and teachers, as well as manage the financial outlook of the district while ensuring we can maintain the buildings and grounds, remain competitive in teacher pay and ensure our students have the resources and opportunities for them to be successful. In 2019, the School Board approved a 5 year Comprehensive School Improvement Plan (CSIP). This plan was developed by a 24 person committee, represented by a wide variety of patrons, parents, students, teachers, school board members, and administration. This committee developed 4 focus areas for the next 5 years:

Lafayette County Children's Service Fund Grants

The Lafayette County Children's Service Fund is funded through a 1/8th of a cent sales tax measure that was approved in 2005 by the citizens of Lafayette County. The funds are awarded to local agencies that provide services to children and youth ages 19 or less in Lafayette County.

Wellington- Napoleon R-IX Schools has been funded for the following two grants through the LCCSF:

Sensory Room: This is the 4th year our sensory room has been funded. We are very fortunate to have a sensory room to help ensure our students are successful throughout the school day. Mrs. Devin Graf, OTA, does a phenomenal job of structuring the room to serve students, Pre-K to 12th grade, within our school who have shown signs of distress holding them back from making as much academic progress as possible. The purpose of the sensory room is to provide students with school -based prevention services. Many of the kids with sensory distress are not receiving services on an IEP or 504 plan. Most of these students have ADD, ADHD, Anxiety, Depression, Sensory Disorders, or other physical and mental health issues such as trauma, PTSD, etc. When students visit the sensory room, they have a sensory plan that consists of physical exercises they work through to meet their sensory needs. Some exercises are alerting, some for calming, others for movement and balance which creates focus in the brain. Students work through these exercises then return to class.

School Based Therapist: We were recently awarded a grant to provide our students and families with a full time Licensed Professional Counselor. The past two years, Compass Health has provided a Licensed Professional Counselor two days a week (funded by LCCSF), who has served 20 students, with several more on a waiting list needing to be served. With the award of this grant, having a full time counselor, we will be able to serve over 40 students in need of therapy. Students and families previously served through the part-time Compass Health grant have experienced personal, social, and academic success. Through school-based mental health, students have created stronger relationships with family, peers, and teachers. Many students receiving school based therapy have presented with suicidal ideation, thus continuing this service locally is truly necessary to the health and well-being of our students and their families. We feel very fortunate to add Mrs. Bailey Williams to our team as our School Based Therapist.

Sandra Bodenhamer Zeysing Memoria

Over the past 10 years, the families of Sandra Bodenhamer Zeysing have raised and donated over \$75,000 to the Wellington-Napoleon R-IX Schools in memory of Sandra and her love for education. That money has been used to buy books, library furniture, laptops, e-readers, an outdoor reading area, field event practice area for pole vault, shot-put, discus and long/triple jump, development of sensory room, makerspace room and the purchase of a 3-D printer and school supplies for over 400 students and 65 staff.

This past July, the 9th annual golf tournament was a huge success. With all the donations, teams, and volunteer labor, the family managed to raise \$9,700 to donate to Wellington-Napoleon Schools. The money was used to purchase school supplies for the District supply closet, greatly reducing every family's out of pocket cost.

The District would like to thank the Bodenhamer/Zeysing families for their hard work and planning that has gone into this event the past 10 years. and for the combined total of \$76,300 in donations to the Wellington-Napoleon R-IX School District.

Kids First was formed July 1, 2004, with an endowment of \$30,000 from the estate of Bernice Osthoff. Mrs. Osthoff was a career teacher in Wellington and surrounding area school districts. Kids First Education Foundation of Wellington & Napoleon is approved by the IRS as a public, non-profit Federal Tax Exempt 501 C-3 Organization. Kids First is incorporated under the State of MO as a public non-profit charity and has tax exemption status also from the State of Missouri.

Operation of Kids First is done by a volunteer board from members of our community. Many items are donated during the course of a year to keep cost of promotions at a minimum. Fundraising events for Kids First are a Banquet and Auction on March 19th and the Gospel Sing on November 14th. The Kids First Board uses funds to furnish scholarships, classroom grants, and dual enrollment scholarships to enhance the education experience of students in the Wellington-Napoleon School District. Selection of grant recipients is kept unbiased by a system where numbers instead of names are placed on scholarship applications during the selection process.

In 16 years Kids First has given student scholarships, classroom grants, dual enrollment grants, and District grants for a total of \$230,000


Gena Lewis Paraprofessional


Kiersten Reynolds Music


